## Worship Services

St. Paul's offers four unique Sunday services, each honoring the Anglican worship tradition. Christian formation classes for all ages are conveniently offered between 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. services. The Nursery is open Sundays from 8:45 a.m.-12:15 p.m. On the second Sunday of each month (September through May), a Choral Evensong is held at 4:00 p.m.

### Sundays

**7:45 a.m. Holy Eucharist** (45 minutes)

This spoken service uses traditional language from The Book of Common Prayer.

**9:00 a.m. Holy Eucharist** (1 hour)

This sung service features our Intergenerational Choir. A sermon alternative is provided for children ages 3-8.

**11:15 a.m. Holy Eucharist** (just over 1 hour)

This sung service is led by St. Paul's Adult Choir.

**6:00 p.m. Archway Eucharist** (45 minutes, [www.archwayindy.org](http://www.archwayindy.org))

This new evening Eucharist, set in the rear of the church, includes a conversational sermon and simple piano music.

### Wednesdays

**8:00 a.m. Holy Eucharist & Healing** (30 minutes)

The laying on of hands for healing is an optional part of this service. In the privacy of the Alcove, a priest will pray with and anoint those who come.

## **ACOLYTES & LAY EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS**

An acolyte was originally “one who follows”—the one who lit and carried candles, prepared bread and wine at the Eucharist and in other ways “followed” the priest.

Today Acolytes and Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) assist St. Paul’s clergy in the many and varied liturgical rites of the church. This ministry provides a hands-on, active role in the worship life of the parish, and is available to youth fourth-grade and older as well as adults. Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) administer the consecrated sacraments and also serve in the role of Acolyte when needed.

Acolytes and LEMS must undergo training when first joining this ministry. Acolyte training is held on the first Saturday of the month at the church; call first to make arrangements. LEM training (after approval of the Rector) is scheduled and provided on an individual basis after a period of studying the diocesan-based training manual and other references. All LEMS and acolytes are required to participate in the annual group “refresher” training. Acolytes and LEMS serve at least one Sunday per month. There are over 150 Sunday services per year plus special services such as weddings, funerals, ordinations, and Holy Days. Acolytes and Lay Eucharistic Ministers are needed for all of these services.

Involvement in St. Paul’s Chapter of the International Order of St. Vincent (OSV) is encouraged, although not required. The OSV is made up of lay ministers and lay leaders who follow the liturgical practices of the Church. Anyone who is called, trained, and authorized according to church canons to perform a lay ministry can become a member of OSV. This includes Acolytes and their Adult Leaders, Altar Guild (Sacristan), Chorister, Lay Eucharistic Minister, Lay Readers /Lectors, Subdeacons, Vergers, Ushers, and Greeters. The Order aims to promote holy living among its members, unity in Christ and friendship and camaraderie among lay ministers, as well as loyalty and full cooperation to the clergy and lay leaders. Also, members are encouraged to regularly attend and promote the Holy Eucharist, to assist in preparation for its reception and to teach the complete Sacramental Faith.

## ADULT FORMATION COMMITTEE

## ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild is an intergenerational ministry comprised of about 25 members. Our job is to prepare for and clean up following every service held in the church, including the 5 weekly services of Holy Eucharist, weddings, burials, and other special services. We are responsible for caring for our communion vessels, altar hangings and linens, flowers, candles, and other liturgical appointments. We work in weekly teams, so each member serves on a team that is "on duty" only one week out of the month. This is a quiet, behind-the-scenes kind of ministry, and our members share a wonderful esprit d'corps.

## ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

St. Paul's Archives were established in 1994 to satisfy a canonical requirement that all parish records be preserved. Vestry minutes were microfilmed up to a certain point and materials on hand have been sorted, but much work remains to evaluate and conserve the collection. Anyone knowledgeable regarding the accession and cataloging of materials is encouraged to join this committee. The establishment of the archives made possible the research necessary for the publication of a history of St. Paul's, *Blessings On Thee Old St. Paul's*, written by parishioners Alice Ashby Roettger and Dr. Joseph Thompson. This definitive history of the congregation won first-place honors in a competition sponsored by the Indiana Religious History Association.

### **BREAD MINISTRY**

Bread Ministry is an evangelism activity that welcomes newcomers and visitors to the parish. Bread is the universal symbol of nourishment and hospitality, so we bring a loaf of bread and information about St. Paul's to those visitors who fill out an information card from the pew rack. Volunteers benefit through meeting new members and growing the body of Christ, and the newcomers feel welcomed and attached to the parish after being visited. Participants are scheduled about twice every three months. They are responsible for checking the visitor cards, creating the information packets from items at the church, and delivering the bread and information packets to newcomers within a week of the visitor card being filled out. Bread Ministry members must have a car and be able to drive to bring the packets to people.

### **ST. PAUL'S CHOIR & CHOIR SCHOOL**

St. Paul's Choir and St. Paul's Choir School is a unique ministry involving musically trained boys and girls who sing with adults. St. Paul's Choir is a modern blending of mixed voices that has served as a model for choirs in Episcopal congregations throughout the country. The singers' time spent in rehearsals is intense preparation for a sacramental duty in the life of worship and prayer. When children take on such enormous liturgical responsibility they create an atmosphere of vitality and life for the worshiping community. The young mind can accomplish these acts with remarkable ease, and children respond readily to challenges, routine, structure, community, and above all, consistency.

St. Paul's Choir and Choir School are affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music in America. The Choir School for youth is open to children in third grade and above. Each child who enters the music program receives individual instruction in music theory, vocal training and Christian Formation, including the traditions of our Anglican Faith. Previous musical experience is not necessary for children, since a thorough grounding in basic musicianship is given to boys and girls who enter the choir. All levels of the RSCM Program are designed to challenge each young musician on an individual basis, and give a sense of accomplishment and self-esteem. St. Paul's Choir has toured both U.S.A. and Great Britain where they have sung in many historic churches and cathedrals. These experiences give our singers an invaluable look at their world present and past.

Members of St. Paul's Choir need to have basic music reading skills and an enthusiasm for choral singing. Private music theory instruction is available for individuals who desire to develop or improve music reading skills provided a commitment is made toward choir participation. A singer does not need to be a member of the parish or the Episcopal Church. Those singers who participate need the awareness and desire to be a part of a rich religious tradition that involves music, liturgy and scripture. Personal and spiritual growth is achieved through the dedicated sharing of our musical gifts, serving as leaders of weekly worship on Sundays, singing at monthly Choral Evensongs, and participating in concerts with orchestra. The Order of the Daughters of the King (DOK) is a spiritual sisterhood of women dedicated to a life of prayer, service and evangelism. We have made a commitment to Jesus as our savior, and we follow him as Lord of our lives. We are an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with the Episcopal Church, or churches in the Historic Episcopate. We don't just enroll as members and attend meetings: we take life-long vows to follow the Rule of Prayer and Rule of Service.

If a woman feels called to become a Daughter, she joins a class for the study period of eight bi-weekly sessions, which are led by other Daughters. The sessions of study, discussion, and prayer provide an opportunity for learning about the Order,

We co-exist with The Episcopal Community (TEC) and meet jointly on the second Saturday of each month from 10:00-11:30 a.m. in CRI; you are welcome to join us any time as a guest.
