To mark the Christmas Season, lessons are read by laity and clergy, with carols and hymns sung by the choir and congregation. The scriptures and hymns all combine to express the fulfillment of God's promise in the good news of great joy for all people, which is the birth of Jesus, who is the Messiah, the Lord.


