Rector's Column

Hear again the Good News

"This is my Son, the Beloved; Listen to him!"
Mark 9:7b

In many ways, Lent is a call to re-tool our listening skills; to listen afresh to the words of Jesus; to hear again the Good News of salvation; to become aware of "the still small voice" within you. One way we can listen to our Lord is through the scriptures proclaimed in our worship. P.C. Edwards, one of my seminary professors, and his co-author, Robert Bennett, offer in their book, The Bible for Today's Church, several practical tips to help us hear God speak to us when the Bible is read aloud in worship:

1. See the Bible as bearing a message for today and not simply as a word out of the past about the past. No matter how old a passage might be, it can help us to understand the shape of our condition, and it can speak to us in the here and now. Inspiration, as Anglicans understand it, is two part: we believe that the Holy Spirit inspired the author of the particular book or letter of the Bible, and we believe the Holy spirit inspires us when we seek to hear and understand. Listen for a message to you as an individual and to us as a con-

gregation and as Americans living the 21st century. More often than not, a scripture passage was written to a community rather than to an individual. We should listen for communal messages as well.

2. Be conscious of the setting of the particular passage in the church year. Why was it selected for that day or season? And do the passages relate to one another?

3. How do the hymns and choir anthems speak to the Bible passages and seasonal themes? Even if you don't sing, consider opening up the hymnal and reading the song. Our hymns are indeed "poems of grace."

4. Read the scripture lessons before the service begins, and say a prayer asking God to speak to you and to the congregation through the Bible passages. Pray for the preacher, too, that he or she might proclaim the Good News.

5. Finally, I would add that expectations are important. If we expect to hear a message relevant to our lives, we will; if we don't we won't. So, let us "listen to him!"

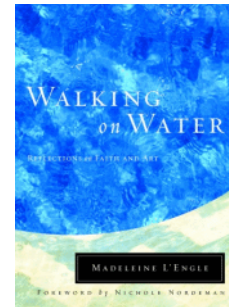

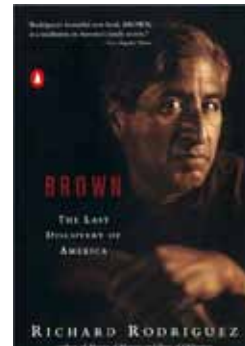
Walking on Water: Reflections on Faith and Art by Madeleine L'Engle (Harold

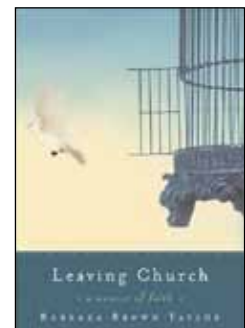
Brown: The Last Discovery of America by Richard Rodriguez (Penguin 2002).

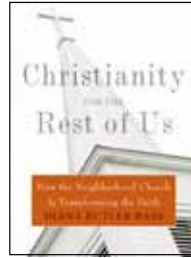

Adult Lenten Series • Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m.

From Tourist to Pilgrim



Come as you can; attend one session or all five! With assistance from Diana Butler Bass' *Christianity for the Rest of Us: How the Neighborhood Church Is Transforming the Faith*, the Lenten series takes an in-depth look at five of the major signposts of renewal that the author discovered in her study of vital mainline protestant congregations.

According to Bass, many people who visit mainline congregations are "spiritual tourists," unwilling and/or unable to make a long term commitment to a religious organization. Bass suggests that authentic Christianity offers a deeper, more permanent, and ultimately better way of life than is available to a visiting tourist.

An authentic Christian is someone who is willing to become a "pilgrim," a year-round person who adopts a new place and a new identity by learning a new language, life rhythms and life-affirming practices. Unlike tourists, pilgrims embark on faith journeys, not to escape life, but to embrace it more deeply.

Each Tuesday in Lent (now through March 31) we will meet in the Lilly Room at 6:30 p.m. for a light supper and to explore Bass' five signposts: healing, contemplation, testimony, worship and reflection. Each session will conclude with a brief worship service.

LAGRIME DI SAN PIETRO

Featuring Brian Schkeeper, conductor, and performers from Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music. *Lagrime di San Pietro (The Tears of Saint Peter)*, a cycle of spiritual madrigals, was written between 1593-1594 by Orlando di Lasso and dedicated to Pope Clement VIII.

The work is comprised of twenty madrigals in Italian and concludes with a Latin motet. The piece was Lasso's swansong, and for a man who was not always the most devout, his final offering of penance to the Church and God. The text relates the many aspects that must have confronted the distraught Peter during the circumstances of the Passion week. **Admission is free.**

March is the third month in our New Year's resolution to stop by one of the St. Paul's libraries and look for something different to read. This might be a good month to look for any answers you seek about teachings and worship in the Episcopal Church. Whether you are new to St. Paul's, a cradle Episcopalian, or someone befriending a visitor, you may be curious about something that occurs during our worship. The books listed below, all found in the Roberts Library, could provide the information you need.

[A User's Guide to the Holy Eucharist, Rites I & II: A User Guide to the Book of Common Prayer](#) by Christopher L. Webber, 1997, (264.36 Web). This very small book examines the Sunday morning services, section by section, explaining what is happening and why.

The library has the following excellent series of five short books, each written by members of the Episcopal clergy:

[Welcome to the Episcopal Church: an Introduction to Its History, Faith, and Worship](#) by Christopher L. Webber, 1999, (283.73 Web).

[Welcome to Sunday: an Introduction to Worship in the Episcopal Church](#) by Christopher L. Webber, 2003, (264.03 Web).

[Welcome to the Book of Common Prayer](#) by Vicki K. Black, 2005, (264.03 Bla). This is a user's guide that also provides history and background for a better understanding of the entire book.

[Welcome to the Church Year: An Introduction to the Seasons of the Episcopal Church](#) by Vicki K. Black, 2004, (263.9 Bla).

[Welcome to the Bible](#) by Vicki K. Black and Peter W. Wenner, 2007, (220.61 Bla). The authors wrote this book to make the Bible more accessible to everyone. It includes suggestions for beginning to read the Bible and ways to incorporate it into daily devotions.

Seven volumes of the New Church's Teaching Series are also valuable aids to answering our questions. This series is dedicated to helping Anglicans deepen their understanding of their faith. The authors include Episcopal priests, theologians, and seminary lecturers. The books in this series address their subjects in greater depth than the preceding series.

[The Anglican Vision](#) by James E. Griffiss, 1997, (283.73 Gri). The author addresses the church's origins, mission, theology and worship, and its place in the 21st century.

[Opening the Bible](#) by Roger Ferlo, 1997, (220.61 Fer), addresses how to compare translations, use cross-references, and respectfully read the Bible as scripture.

[Engaging the Word](#) by Michael Johnston, 1998, (220.61 Joh). This author provides practical tools for examining scripture. He addresses ethical questions, the nature of God, and the teachings of Jesus.

[Early Christian Traditions](#) by Rebecca Lyman, 1999, (270 Lym). This is an introduction to the world of the early church, including religious fervor, theological controversy, and persecution, and their role in shaping the church in the Middle Ages.

[Opening the Prayer Book](#) by Jeffrey Lee, 1999, (264.03 Lee). This is a deep examination of the Book of Common Prayer, including its history, development and importance in the Anglican Communion.

[Horizons of Mission](#) by Titus Presler, 2001, (266.3 Pre). The author describes the scriptural basis of the church's mission, and how gospel understandings are being reshaped by Christians in Africa, Asia and Latin America. He offers help for parishes that seek to engage in world mission.

[The Theology of Worship](#) by Louis Weil, 2002, (264.03). This book examines the foundations of Anglican worship and encourages Episcopalians to engage new forms of culture, music, and liturgical prayer in order to renew our worship for realities of the 21st century.

Maundy Thursday

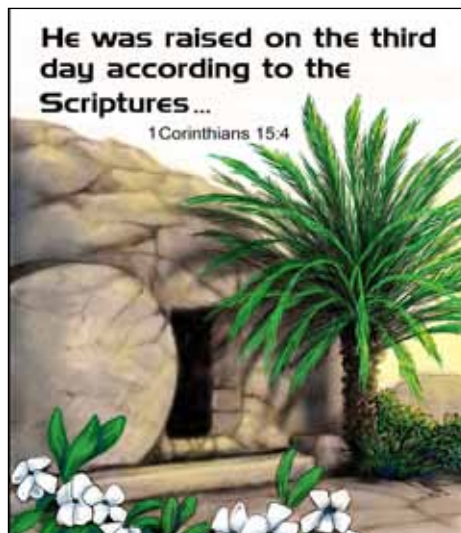

Holy Eucharist with Ceremony of
Foot Washing, Agape Meal and
Stripping of the Altar

This night we celebrate the Liturgy of the Lord's Supper to recall the sacred final meal Jesus shared with his companions. We recall three stories integral to this holy night. We remember the Passover Meal of the Hebrew people as they escaped from bondage in Egypt. We recall how Jesus startled his disciples by washing their feet as they gathered to eat together. And we re-enact the blessing of bread and wine that has become our sacred meal. Our commemoration is rich with the tangible symbols of foot-washing, bread and wine. By the washing of feet, we are formed into a community of disciples who know the humility of service. In the broken bread and poured wine, we receive Jesus into our midst.

At the end of the service, the Sacrament is reserved in the Chapel of the Good Shepherd and watch is kept until 10:00 p.m. Through this night we approach once again the mystery of our redemption in the shape of the Cross.

Liturgy of Good Friday

April 10 • 12:00 noon

This Liturgy incorporates the reading of the Passion Gospel with hymns and anthems that portray the story of the cross. We hear once again the account of Jesus' passion, venerate the cross, and receive the bread and wine consecrated the previous night.

This brings us face-to-face with the costly victory of the cross. A sermon will be preached and hymns and anthems appropriate to Good Friday will be sung. Beginning at 1:00 p.m., the church will be open for meditation and silent prayer.

Holy Saturday Liturgy

April 11 • 9:00 a.m.

This service of waiting (Book of Common Prayer, pg. 283) is said before the church is prepared for the celebration of Easter.

The Great Vigil of Easter

April 11 • 8:00 p.m.

The Great Vigil of Easter celebrates new fire, new light, new life and resurrection. In a darkened church, we kindle the fire, bless and light the Paschal Candle, and recount God's mighty acts of salvation through history. As Christians have for centuries, we gather at the font and rejoice as we baptize those raised to new life in Christ.

Finally, we receive the glorious risen Christ once again in our midst as we move from death to life with the jubilation of alleluias, and receive Christ's very presence in the bread and wine of the first Eucharist of Easter. The Great Vigil of Easter, with solemn liturgy, celebrates new life with the ancient songs of Isaiah and Moses. This is one of the most powerful liturgies of the Church.
