# A message from our Interim Rector

I am energized and excited about ministry and mission at and through St. Paul's. We are a vibrant, mission focused parish with an abundance of resources. While it is certainly true that we have experienced recent loss of revenue as a result of market realities, and no matter how quickly the market recovers our draw from endowment will be affected for several years, it is also true that God has blessed and continues to bless St. Paul's with an abundance of resources in every conceivable sense. I have much that I want to say about this, from a theological perspective rather than from any expertise in accounting and investments, and will have an article in next month's Connections where I share my thoughts on this important area of our life as a community of faith.

Today, however, I will expand on the news that I have hired The Rev. Robin Myers and The Rev. Tim Fleck. Robin begins on July 13 and will serve in primarily pastoral functions until the end of November when it is expected that Jean Denton will be able to return to active ministry at St. Paul's. Tim is a newly ordained deacon and will be with us through the end of August. He will function as a deacon in our worship and in other ways within the life of St. Paul's as I direct him. My goal with Tim is to give him a solid foundation in ministry as he begins his vocation. I think St. Paul's can provide this and that the rest of Tim's ministry will be positively affected by his experience with us this summer.

Robin and Tim are joining a highly functioning ministry team that will benefit from their skills, gifts and personalities. This summer will be a time of intentional

planning and team-building and my expectations are high, both for staff and for the parish. Whatever you may think you know about "Interim" time, I invite you to open your imagination to a new way. I do not see myself as a "place-holder" and will be encouraging, guiding and leading with all of my skill, experience and imagination. Mission and ministry will

not only continue; but will grow.

Some specifics: We will support and enable the many ongoing ministries (Choirs, Lectors, LEM's, Acolytes, Altar Guild, and so forth) that week by week are essential for our corporate life and worship, and we will restart some ministries, such as Fun and Fellowship and new member classes of discovery. We will make sure that new ministry and worship initiatives, such as Archway and Community of Hope, will thrive and grow. Beyond maintaining and even growing ministries though, we will work on clarifying our understanding of mission within the context of our vision statement, "Innovative Mission for Christ." I think that we should be able to define a clear statement of mission and methodology that guides St. Paul's in use of all its resources. We will also look at positive evaluation as I work with our Vestry at developing and doing a process and methodology of Mutual Ministry Review.

While I don't expect this to be everyone's favorite topic, we will explore and learn together from recent experience. This summer our entire staff will be reading and discussing "Preventing Sexual Abuse in Congregations – A Resource for Leaders" by Karen A. McClintock. I am working on scheduling a workshop for the entire parish to help us both understand and to learn all that we can about creating as safe an environment at St. Paul's as we possibly can. Beyond that, we will look carefully at our history because even though you have done that before, this is an opportunity to gain fresh perspective and understanding, and to celebrate the positive ministry and contribution in so many vital ways, of Rich Winters.

I expect that we will accomplish these objectives during this coming fall and winter, with an "Understanding and Celebrating our History" day sometime in the early spring. I am asking our parish leadership to put their energy, skill and imagination into these discernment and developmental tasks before moving on to a discernment and search committee process for the next "settled" rector. I have been called as "transitional" rector and will

function well for you in that office. Our time will be good and well. St. Paul's will thrive and continue to grow. Some would say, "Relax and enjoy the ride," but I say to you "let your anxieties be replaced with certainty, prayer and action as we prepare for new direction."

I am also available for prayer and "listening" as well as for planning and development. My schedule is managed by my personal secretary, Marilyn Vargo. To make an appointment for any reason please call Marilyn at 253-1277 extension 12. She will be happy to schedule a meeting or visit.

# Retired Altar linens given a new purpose

This is a remarkable story of “God-incidences” (not coincidences!) of which many in the Altar Guild were aware that I felt moved to share with the wider parish family.

As you are aware, the church uses many small linens in serving holy communion, which occurs in at least five services per week. These linens wear out over time and need to be replaced, but because they have been set apart for their holy purpose, we do not simply toss them in the trash. We used to burn them and return their ashes to the earth, but we have a new practice.

We now send our retired linens to a woman at St. Paul’s Episcopal Church in Shaker Heights, Ohio, who in turn takes them to a group of women called the Stitching Post Bees, in particular, a member of that group named Alice. Her unique sewing ministry is to use the linens to make gowns, bonnets, booties, and blankets for infants. She might use a piece to line a collar, or cut out the embroidery to stitch on the front of a gown, but she finds creative ways to use the fabric so that every garment she makes contains a piece of the holy linens. She is meticulous in her work, stitching with great respect and reverence. The gowns, bonnets, booties, and blankets have a special purpose of their own. They are taken to hospitals in the Cleveland area and become the burial gowns for abandoned or premature infants who do not survive.

Alice is a Christian. She and her helpers hold hands and pray over their work. She says of her ministry “having the opportunity to do something for a family in crisis is such a privilege. It is so important to me to give back to the community. They need never know who made the gown, just that someone cared and loved enough to make it for them.”

This connection was made because Sammy, the woman who drives the linens to Alice and then picks up the finished garments to deliver to the hospitals, attends church with a woman who went to nursing school with a member of our Altar Guild. Not only that, but Sammy was recently a presenter at the ECW Province V meeting held here in late April, where I was able to meet her and see some of the finished items. In our Sacristy there is a small photo album of the garments, as well as a copy of Alice’s own words about her ministry. All are welcome to stop in to take a look.

There is one other thing you need to know about Alice. She is confined to the Ohio Reformatory for Women, a prison where she is serving a life sentence. I personally find this to be an amazing example of God’s love and grace connecting distant dots to form a circle that embraces many lives, and God’s mercy and redemption of a life which otherwise would have seemed wasted but is now fulfilling great and sacred purpose. Food for thought for all of us as we consider what gifts we have and ways we can serve God by serving others.

**Brendan**, Frederick Buechner, 1987 (FIC BUE). This is a story of the legendary Celtic St. Brendan. This book could be a good choice for readers who are interested in Ireland, Celtic Christianity or 15th century history.

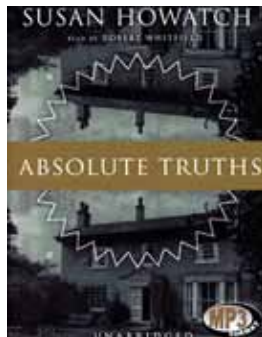
**The Kitchen Madonna**, Rumer Godden, 1966 (FIC GOD). Godden has written a charming short tale of loving-kindness and true hospitality seen through the eyes of a young boy in London. This might be a good book to share with a child.



**Almost Friends**, Philip Gulley, 2006 (FIC GUL). One of the popular Harmony Novel series, this book is set in a Quaker congregation in small town Indiana. Gulley's writing has been compared to that of Garrison Keillor, Jan Karon and James Herriot.

**All Creatures Great and Small**, 1972, **All Things Bright and Beautiful**, 1974, James Herriot (B HER). It could be time to re-read these beloved autobiographical stories written by a practicing veterinarian in Yorkshire, England that were the basis for the PBS television series of the same name.

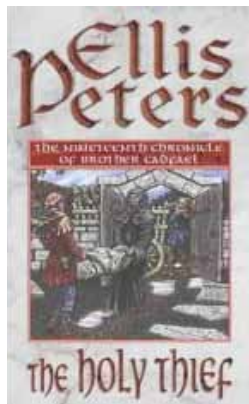
**Absolute Truths**, Susan Howatch, 1995 (FIC HOW). Set in the fictional cathedral city of Starbridge, England, this novel is an exploration of faith with something for everybody. It is a tale of



power struggles, passion, theology and scandal set among the clergy of present day England. Our library owns several other novels by the same author.

**At Home in Mitford**, Jan Karon, 1994 (FIC KAR). This is the first book in the beloved Mitford Series, the gentle story of an Episcopal priest and his friends in a small southern town. The library also has several other books in this series.

**The Holy Thief**, Ellis Peters, 1992 (FIC PET). If you like mysteries or English medieval history, you may be charmed by this novel, set in a monastery in 1144 during the civil war in the time of King Stephen. The herbalist/sleuth featured in the novels of this series inspired the PBS Brother Cadfael Mysteries. The Roberts Library holds 8 Brother Cadfael titles.



**To Darkness and to Death**, Julia Spencer-Fleming, 2005 (FIC SPE). If you prefer contemporary mysteries, try this one set in New York State, and featuring a female Episcopal priest. Spencer-Fleming is especially skilled in describing the action scenes in her novels that address contemporary issues of the Episcopal Church, as well as the personal and ethical struggles of the main character.
