Rector's Report

The Rev. John Denson, D.Min, Rector

How shall I describe 2022, our third "out of the ordinary" year in a row? I'll suggest we think of the past year as one of transition. To which you might ask: a transition from what to what?

We could say it was a transition from pandemic status to endemic status. I don't know if technically we've moved to the endemic stage with Covid, but most of us have shifted to living with it as if it's endemic. We started 2022 with masks required, half of our pews blocked off to encourage physical distancing, and many activities and ministries restricted in order to limit the possibilities of infection.

We ended 2022 with worship and ministries essentially back to normal.

We could say 2022 was a transition from in-person worship to hybrid worship. After a long experience with online worship from March 2020 through May 2021, we returned to regular Sunday morning in-person worship in June 2021. Regular livestreaming of Sunday worship did not start until January 2022. We now experience hybrid worship every Sunday. Most people still worship in-person but others worship via the livestream. Never again will we be a community in which everyone experiencing our worship does so from the same location.

We could say 2022 was a transition from a pre-pandemic church to a post-pandemic church. We are not the church we were in 2019. People who were active members in 2019 have not returned or attend less frequently. Newcomers have joined us who have no memory of St. Paul's before the pandemic. Our staff has changed with two significant transitions (one in 2021; the other in 2022). Parishioner engagement has changed. Our average in-person attendance on Sunday mornings in 2022 was about 60% of what it was in 2019. And our pool of volunteers has gotten smaller as people have re-prioritized the ways they want to spend their time.

St. Paul's today is not the St. Paul's of 2019. We have reasons to grieve our losses, especially for parishioners who have died or are no longer physically able to get to church. We also have reasons to celebrate, as evidenced by the number of youth who participated in our Deep Dive program in the last quarter of 2022.

Accepting that we've changed is an important step in imagining our future. This coming year will be a year of prayerful community discernment as we seek to determine who God is calling us to be. The mission and vision developed in 2019 no longer apply, at least in their current iterations. They were created for a different time in the life of the parish. Who is God calling us to be in a changed world and transformed church? This is but one of many questions for us to ask and answer in 2023. I look forward to walking this journey with you.



RECTOR'S REPORT, CONTINUED

But let me take one more look back before turning fully toward 2023 as I recognize and thank a few people and ministries that made a particular difference in 2022.

• The members of the Vestry who led during such challenging times. Thank you to Pam Douglas, Brad Love, George Slenski and Matt Ellis who are completing their terms on the vestry service. I will note in particular the service of Matt Ellis who is completing his second consecutive term. He served six years, four of those years as a warden (one year as Junior Warden and three years as Senior Warden). Abundant thanks to Matt for his strong, wise and faithful leadership.

• Barb Pierce (Senior Warden) and Jeff Kelsey (Junior Warden) for their steady leadership and support over the past year.

• Chris Johns, our Treasurer: Chris was appointed in Treasurer eight years ago, in February 2014. His service has been extraordinary not only because of the number of years he has served in this role. He has been transformative, leading us through the shift in our fiscal year, the 2015 capital campaign and the funding of the initiatives that arose from that campaign, the refinancing of our debt, staff transitions, and countless other tasks. Fortunately, we can count on Chris to continue to help with special projects! Thank you, Chris, for your faithful steward and service.

While live streaming will not replace our vibrant and beautiful Sunday services, it is gratifying to know that our financial investment in this technology allows us to invest spiritually in the needs of others virtually. Viewers include our own local parishioners who cannot physically get to church anymore. We are grateful to our church staff, clergy, and volunteers who worked (and continue to work) to make this need a reality.

This year, Vestry has worked to discern our path forward out of the pandemic lockdowns and into new ways of being present and witnessing in our community, particularly with St. Paul's on The Way. We authorized a large donation to the Avenue Foundation Ministry and its new coffee shop in Broad Ripple, which will help to sustain this ministry. This is a community investment in a Black-owned business, whose mission is to address the challenge of intergenerational wealth in Indianapolis. Look for the opening of the Avenue Coffee Shop soon on College Avenue and other ways to support this ministry. Many parishioners also participated in Sacred Ground to begin the deep work of racial reflection and building beloved community. We continue to support many other outreach efforts, including our work with MLK Center and School 43 literacy tutoring for kindergarten classes. We support multiple other important community organizations via Outreach grants and the Christmas Market. Faith, Justice & the Arts continues to work to invest in local artists working at the nexus of faith and justice to witness in different ways to the larger community.

Vestry has also been discerning ways to build and grow our community further in multiple ways. We are particularly interested to help to extend radical welcome to every person with whom we interact and to develop deep beloved community. We hope that every person in our midst feels welcomed and loved and can grow into their faith in ways that fulfills them. We believe the more involved we all are in our faith community the more we all grow in God's love.

Last, it is our honor and blessing to serve this congregation. In this service, we have seen first-hand how hard our faithful and committed clergy and staff work. We continue to be blessed by their service to our community and grateful to them for everything they do for us. We look forward to partnering with them in new and exciting ways to tap into the vibrant potential of our church to spread the love and peace of Jesus Christ to our community.


Treasurer's Report

Chris Johns, Treasurer

St. Paul's reports financial results on a fiscal year (ending June 30). The financial results can be found within this report, and complete set of audited financial statements can be found on our website.

In many ways, this year has been one of transition at St. Paul's. While the height of the pandemic is (hopefully) further in our rear view, awakening from any lingering effects continues to have an impact both socially and financially. Changes in staff has brought new opportunities and perspectives. Financial markets continue to see turbulence. We entered this past year anticipating increased Contributions and program costs with a return to regular services.

During the year, Contributions received exceeded budget expectations (and the prior year results) by approximately \$80,000, or a more than 10% increase. The number of donors also continued to rise, getting closer to pre-pandemic levels. For several years prior to the pandemic,

Total Contribution levels had been fairly flat, averaging in the range of \$750,000 in any year. However, in the past few years, those levels have averaged in the \$800,000 range, and continue to grow. These are pleasant surprises given the times, and reflect the generosity of the people of St. Paul's.

Program costs were increased in the past year to help re-engage the parish and the community, and these costs generally held steady when compared to budget. We made further investments with the addition of equipment to livestream our worship services, as well as in On The Way programs. We also provided significant outreach assistance to The Avenue Foundation to launch a coffee shop and other programming, and build wider community engagement. We were able to fund these initiatives with current reserves, in part by utilizing the last of the funds realized from the 2015 Capital Campaign. We also continued to make regular monthly payments towards the debt.

From an investment perspective, while the Endowment value has fared better than other comparable investors, the value has swung wildly over the past year, in line with market changes. At the end of 2021, our returns were approaching 30% on an annualized basis, whereas our annualized returns over the past year are approximately -11%. Where we ended 2021 with an overall value of \$38.5M, we end 2022 with a value of

approximately \$33.4M. While our draw rate had been at 5.6% or more for the past several years, we had reduced our rate to the 4% range by early 2022. However, the value changes and increased draw needs have caused our rate to move back above 5% (5.1% for the calendar year 2022). The Endowment is a great resource for St. Paul's, and should provide funding well into the future. However, these fluctuations are a reminder of the impact on resources and our stewardship of them.

Like many churches, we continue to face the risks of changing demographics, the pandemic, and other events, all of which may have an impact on our resources. We ended this past fiscal year in a favorable position, and continue to be well-positioned moving forward. Yet this next year appears to be another one of transition. Abnormal inflation will have an increasing impact on staffing and program changes. A volatile market and increased funding needs will have an impact on the Endowment Draw.

Speaking of transition, Lisa White served this parish faithfully for many years in her role as Controller, and began enjoying her retirement in March. In steps Dan Thompson, who has brought a new energy and acumen that will serve this parish well. Welcome Dan!


We have many reasons to be thankful at St. Paul's. As always, we believe our goals are achievable with the faith and support of the people who call this their home.



MINISTRY LEADER HIGHLIGHTS for 2022

FORMATION, COMMUNITY & CARE

The Rev. Barbara Kempf, Associate Rector for Intergenerational Ministry

From January through May, we offered Adult Faith Forums on Sunday mornings (in-person). In addition to monthly Rector's forums, we continued our education and conversation on issues of systemic racism and injustice. We also covered a variety of other topics including, creation care, spiritual practices, and updates from General Convention.

We continued to use a hybrid approach of online and in-person gatherings for our weekday formation offerings. We offered a weekday book study via Zoom on *Walking Each Other Home: Spiritual Care for Dementia Caregivers* by yhe Rev. Jean Denton. We offered a six-week series entitled "Discernment, Discovery, Discipleship." Parishioners Andrea Broxton and Katherine Tyler Scott designed and facilitated this series. Parishioner Larry Johnson continues to coordinate The Tuesday Book Study Group that meets weekly at the Broad Ripple Brew Pub. The Women's Bible Study and Grandmother's Group continue to meet weekly at church. Parishioner Carrie Bernhardt offers twice weekly evening yoga classes at St. Paul's. We also offer a monthly Lunch and Learn series during the program year.

We hosted two Diocesan online trainings for Lay Eucharistic Visitors (LEVs) throughout the Diocese of Indianapolis. We updated training and licensing for our LEVs and expanded the number of those licensed. Clergy also continued to visit homebound parishioners throughout 2022.

To foster spiritual growth and fellowship, during the spring months we offered a weekly "Walk and Pray" on the Monon Trail. In collaboration with Children, Youth and Family Ministries, we continued offering All Parish Coffee Hours on the last Sunday of each month as a way to connect intergenerationally. TGIF, under the leadership of parishioners Alan Davis and George Slenski, meets monthly for fellowship and spiritual growth.

SUNDAY SCHOOL, YOUTH GROUP & FAMILY MINISTRY

Laurie Pierce, Director of Children, Youth & Family Ministry

The year of 2022 started off with distancing and canceling programs yet again with the surge of Omicron. With kids getting quarantined from school because of a sniffle, parents began the year continuing the hold the weight of the pandemic. When we were able to be together, there was a shared sense of extreme exhaustion and longing to be with one another. Parents Group became a source of blessing, to deeply connect and reconnect with other parents away from the kids.

Though tweaked to allow more distance, the Pancake Supper was back with beads, balloons, jazz music and lots of syrup. This year we also added an Ash Wednesday service directly after the Pancake Supper. It was a stark and holy contrast to party, play and feast, then walk into the quiet, dark sanctuary to pray together.

The Youth Group's compassion for the war in Ukraine led to a Bingo Night Fundraiser hosted by the youth. Parishioners and friends of all ages came out for dinner and bingo, proceeds which went to the humanitarian organization on the ground in Ukraine—CARE.



Summer Sundays were full of worship, jump rope, pogo sticks, bubbles and lots of treats.

After two years of not being able to be together at Waycross, the fall retreat came back. We couldn't have asked for better weather. Highlights of the weekend for me included: singing around the campfire, watching kids and adults lead prayer services together, skit night, singing and compline outside and the game of capture the parents. For the first time, we also incorporated service into our weekend and mulched the outdoor chapel on the property.

What does volunteering look like without the common experience of the privileged group swooping in to save the day? The youth group participated in a glimmer of what it may look like. Five St. Paul's teens along with two students from school 43 worked together one Saturday morning to completely organize a huge storage closet that held heaps of unused donations—donations that St. Paul's probably made. By the end of the day, the closet was in working order, where teachers could walk in a find what their student needs. And seven teens that wouldn't normally be together walked away with the starts of a relationship.

We hope 2023 brings more opportunities to work and be in relationship with our sisters and brothers.

OUTREACH & MINISTRY COLLABORATIONS

The Rev. Patrick Burke, Minister for Justice & Community Collaboration

Collaboration with The Avenue Foundation and The Avenue Coffeehouse & Café continued in 2022 under the leadership umbrella of St. Paul's On The Way (SPOTW). Despite setbacks with permits and contractors, the coffee shop is on the verge of opening. The Avenue Foundation's work is ongoing in its mission to build racial and economic equity, and to empower the Black community in Central Indiana to create and sustain generational wealth. Please check out the coffee shop, at the corner of Broad Ripple Ave and College Ave, next to the Vogue Theater, to enjoy a great cup of coffee and support racial justice and equity in our community!

Wilderness Worship, an ecumenical outdoor worshipping community focused on exploring and worshipping God in a natural setting, continued to gather at Ft. Harrison. We have developed a core group that meets every two weeks utilizing worship resources from The Episcopal Church, the Brownsburg Inclusive Catholic Community, and the Celtic Christian tradition.

In 2022 SPOTW was invited by Morning Light to collaborate in building a new volunteer program centered on Contemplative Care at the Abbie Hunt Bryce Home, a hospice home that provides no-cost accommodations to terminally ill people with no means. This is an exciting new ministry opportunity that offers members of St. Paul's, and the wider community, the chance to support some of the most vulnerable members of our community with compassionate care in their final chapter.

Starting in September, SPOTW and Family Ministry collaborated to start a Sacred Ground circle at St. Paul's. This 11 session course is a reading, film and discussion based series on race, grounded in our faith. This series is offered in a hybrid format concluding in May 2023.

SPOTW partnered with the Diocesan Racial Justice and Education Team to co-author a resolution for Diocesan Convention to adopt the Covenant to Root Out Racism. This resolution was adopted by the diocese and provides a pathway for diocesan leaders, ministries and all parishes to continue our collective work to dismantle systemic racism in our churches and communities.

WORSHIP & MUSIC MINISTRY

Brad Hughley, Organist & Director of Music

The general pace of life picked up significantly in 2022 following the languishing early days of the Covid pandemic, and the music program at St. Paul's returned to our regular cadence of in-person worship services. Reestablishing the routine of rehearsing and singing a high volume of music was our primary goal, as well as recruiting for the Choir School. Partially because of restarting the ABC Choir program in February, we added six new beginners in the fall. This brings our youth total to around 25 singers, a fantastic achievement considering the difficulties of maintaining the choir during the pandemic.

Our Choir School continues to grow, and we have more singers participating in the Choral Scholar program. St. Paul's underwrites the cost of private music lessons to scholars who make a strong commitment to the choir. Each scholar also has the option to attend a week-long summer music camp as part of the scholarship. In 2022 we had eight choristers attend camps in Evansville, IN, and at Duke University. The ABC Choir began a new partnership with Butler University's School of Music, and we will be drawing from their music education majors to work as the ABC Choir director in their junior or senior year. The advantage is that we have a community partnership, and the children participating in the class will have a director that uses the same pedagogical approach to offer continuity as ABC Choir directors graduate. In September 2022 we welcomed Ethan Schopp as the ABC Choir Director, who has been wonderful working with our youngest singers.

In the fall we planned an All Souls' service using Maurice Duruflé's Requiem with chamber orchestra and organ. This is usually experienced as a concert, but we instead offered it in the context of the 11:15 a.m. Eucharist on All Saints' Day – a distinct contrast from the celebration and exuberance of the All Saints' liturgy earlier at 9 a.m. with baptisms. The service received such support that it may be repeated each year with other settings of the Requiem mass.

I am eternally grateful for Jacob Taylor and his insights and musical leadership both at the organ and with the choir, and for his administrative help with countless tasks and projects. I consider him an invaluable partner in this ministry, and none of the things we do each week as a music department could happen without him.

ST. PAUL'S MUSIC

Since 2020, St. Paul's Music has had relatively few concerts. The concerts we did have were big productions. In May we assembled an orchestra of 30 musicians and performed a concert length program ("Morning and Evening in England") of liturgical works that have been orchestrated. In the fall St. Paul's Choir offered the Duruflé Requiem in the context of a Holy Eucharist – mostly a worship endeavor but also in collaboration with St. Paul's Music. In December we presented a concert featuring Handel's Messiah (portions from Part One) and J.S. Bach's Magnificat with orchestra and choir. We high-lighted our wonderful staff singers as soloists, and utilized the extraordinary talent of Dr. Jacob Taylor, Assistant Organist and Choir Director.

As we build back our programming for St. Paul's Music, we also need to build back our financial support from donors who have dropped off since the beginning of the pandemic. The work that Meegan Kriner does brings awareness of our program to more people in the metro area, as well as maintaining our donor lists and advertising our concerts. She is an invaluable asset to our staff and to the mission of St. Paul's Music.
